MARCH PROGRAM

Our Lady of Knock Parish, founded in 1957, encompassed the southern part of Calumet City when hundreds of homes were being constructed during the 1950s and '60s to serve Calumet City's large and growing Catholic community. Calumet City already had two parishes, St. Andrew the Apostle, a Polish national parish established in 1892, and St. Victor, organized in 1925; both were bursting at the seams. The school opened in 1958 and by the 1960s had 700 pupils. The Sisters of

St. Dominic of Adrian,
Mich., staffed the school.
After the school closed, the building accommodated a growing CCD program. In 2019, the three parishes combined to form one new Catholic parish, *Jesus, Shepherd of Souls Parish*. Our Lady of Knock church, with its Marian stained-glass windows, continues as one of two worship sites for Mass and several activities.

LaVergne Rose Balacky, 96, nee Zick, was born and raised in Calumet City, then lived in Dyer, Indiana, and recently at St. Patrick's Residence in Naperville, Ill. LaVergne volunteered many years at St. Victor Parish and CCHS, a member here since 1982! She came to many of the dinners and

events, including her last visit to our St. Victor Church program and to attend the final St. Victor Pentecost concert. LaVergne was born in 1925. Her family home was at the southeast corner of Wentworth Avenue and 154th Place (home demolished ca. 2008). Her family owned an ice company that supplied the numerous taverns in Cal City. Her father, William Zick, was Mayor of the City of Calumet City from 1935-1937 & 1937-1941. [Funeral arrangements have not happened as of this printing.]

Cal City History...

Women's History Month

In the history of Calumet City are many notable women. Here are brief descriptions of a select number of women:



Virginia Brooks.

After inheriting some real estate from her father in the early 1910s, Virginia Brooks moved to West Hammond. Next, Virginia Brooks began a brigade against taxes, prostitution, and intemperance. She started a newspaper West Hammond Searchlight to uplift the residents during her vice crusade against

the taverns, dives, and saloons, including State Street. A news article described Miss Virginia Brooks as the 20th-Century Joan of Arc. Miss Brooks turned three shuttered saloons into a day nursery, a soup house, and a social settlement house promoting education to residents in reading and writing English. She also supported the women's suffrage movement. Her house still stands at 322 155th Place.



Gloria L. Dooley.

Former City Clerk of the City of Calumet City, from 2003 to 2011. In 2003, Gloria Dooley accepted the appointment as City Clerk for Calumet City after Michelle Qualkinbush was elected mayor. Gloria was the first African American to hold the office of City Clerk in the City of Calumet City. Previously, Gloria served

a 40-year career as a senior public administrator for the Illinois Department of Employment Security. Unfortunately, Gloria suffered a stroke and died while in office as City Clerk on August 14, 2011. She was praised as a "grand lady who was dedicated to serving her community."



Michelle Markiewicz Qualkinbush.

Michelle was born and raised in Calumet City and attended Lincoln School and TF North. She began her life as a public servant at age 19, working for the city. Michelle was the first female City Clerk for 18 years, from 1985 to 2003. Next,

Michelle was the first female mayor for 18 years, from 2003 to 2021. Michelle said she was proud of the work she did. She supported local organizations and acknowledged for her love of pets. Also, an enormous change to Calumet City—retiring hundreds of liquor licenses to just 41 in 2021 (from 250 in 1990) at the request of residents to remove taverns from dozens of blocks within the neighborhoods.



Faith Bailey.

In 1921, Faith Bailey, R. N., organized the Health Center in Calumet City with the guidance of the Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook County. To fund her Health Center, Mayor Paul Kamradt and citizens sold Christmas Seals. Faith Bailey was a nurse for 37 years and provided health care to the residents of

Calumet City, promoting health rather than just treating disease, especially those with limited income. She was praised for being concerned with the "total child" years. By 1952, the city provided full support of the Health Center under Mayor Frank Kaminski. After her retirement, the new Faith Bailey Health Center was dedicated in 1959, under Mayor Stanley Bejger. Faith was praised for her community nursing. In the early 2010s, since healthcare was abundant, the city closed and demolished the building.



Sister Alban Hermes.

In 1984, Sr. Alban Hermes, a Sinsinawa Dominican nun, arrived at Our Lady of Knock Church as the pastoral associate. Sr. Alban helped with the church's Bible studies, services, outreach, adult education, and in the Ministry of Care, where she visits those who are sick, homebound, or in the hospital, as well as the


elderly. Sr. Alban was director and a founding member of the Calumet City Resource Center, which provides food and clothing for the needy. First starting at St. Victor Church, the churches worked together at its long-time home, 202 155th Place. Sr. Alban worked tirelessly, filling bags and recruiting volunteers. In 2004, Sister Alban received the Mother Teresa Award from the Italian Catholic Federation. Upon retiring after 30 years here, she said, "I'm grateful to have been part of the families in Calumet City and part of the parish. It's been a very faith-fulfilling experience."




Esther Schrum.

A local historian, Esther enjoyed teaching and sharing the history of pioneer life, including her family as early settlers. Esther Schrum conducted Children's Story Hour at the library and told many stories about earlier days, farming, art, and life on the Schrum farm. Esther was

involved with the Calumet City Woman's Club. She was president of the Thornton Fractional Township High School Scholarship Foundation. In 1968, she displayed a 21-star flag at her home, 26 Schrum Road, for the 150th year of Illinois statehood. In 1975, Esther was a founding board member of the Calumet City Historical Society.


Upcoming Events:
