Cal City History...


Konstantine M. Woszczynski

"While America has been the land of opportunity for the millions of Europeans, it is proof of unusual ability, exceptional business integrity, and leadership among men, when a young man can come across the seas and in a few years reach business success and besides his official relations with banks and business organizations be honored as mayor of a city and take a prominent part in public affairs. Such has been the distinction of Konstantine M. Woszczynski, now mayor of the City of West Hammond.

Konstantine was born in German Poland on August 12, 1872, a son of Vincent and Theophilia Woszczynski. The father was a farmer. With an education acquired in the common schools of his native land, Mr. K. M. Woszczynski came to America in 1889 at the age of 17 and, for the first six years, was employed in a bicycle factory in Chicago. His residence at West Hammond dates from 1895, and he was known as a worker in the Simplex factory. He was a machine hand for three years and then was made foreman in the polishing and plating department of the Tube Works, which place he held for two years. For three years, he was a foreman in the Enterprise Bed Company and then gave most of his attention to the operation of a moving picture house in East Chicago. In 1908, he established a saloon on State Line Street.

For three terms, Mr. Woszczynski was a trustee of the Village of West Hammond and was elected mayor in 1911 and served as mayor from 1912 to 1915. He is a former president of the Board of Directors of the public schools of West Hammond and was part of the management. It was due to the enterprise of Mr. Woszczynski that the King John III Sobieski No. 1 Building and Loan Association of West Hammond was organized in 1901, and he has been secretary since the beginning. Mr. Woszczynski is a director of the West Hammond Trust & Savings Bank. In November 1895, in Chicago, he married Mary Bizan, born in German Poland. Their four children are Mieczyslaus, Alfons, Henry, and Alice. The family worships

in St. Andrew Church." [History written ca. 1913, extracted by Renee Adams].

John Hessler was the first President for two years and then reelected to lead again in 1909. In 1911, there was a vote to change the form of government to a city form, but it was tied up in the courts until 1912. Konstantine Woszczynski won the April 1911 election by nine votes, but it stalled while the case was in court. The village board canceled further meetings until the election in April 1912, when the court cleared the way to count the votes to change to a city form, and Woszczynski won again overwhelmingly and was mayor from 1912 to 1915 until Paul Kamradt won as mayor. Mayor K.M. Woszczynski was a reformer and tried to rid the city of prostitution. At the time, it was difficult to prosecute the business owners because the businesses were only licensed, not bonded. The mayor started to bond the owner residents so they could be arrested, and he successfully closed down many gambling houses and prostitution. He did not publicly shame the owners so that the image of West Hammond maintained a positive light to the general public. He told the residents that this method was the best practice to protect their property. He may have lost the 1915 election because, in 1914, he had to raise taxes to pay for debt incurred by the previous administration and pay for public improvements of streets. In 1915, Mayor Kamradt praised his reform work. [Extracted from Cottage to Bungalow, Bigott].



"Sunday, December 3, 1939, 1st Mayor of Calumet City Back in Town — The first mayor left Calumet City for Poland in 1921 to recover property left to his wife by her parents. By his astute business judgment in Posen, Woszczynski acquired coal and lumber yards and became wealthy. However, during the 1930 depression in Poland, he lost practically his entire fortune of \$150,000. Like most Poles, he gathered the rem-

nants of a lost fortune and, by frugal living and as prosperous times came back, he again built up his business. He then expanded his operations to include a small apartment hotel and several stores in Posen. He and his wife came back to this country in July. Since that, the war has broken out, and Poland has fallen into the hands of the Germans. "I have not heard anything of my daughter since the war," he told Frank Stachowicz, former Calumet City justice of the peace, "I do not know whether I can return." *[Indiana, 12-3-1939]*.
